October 28th – Westward Beach to Pt. Dume and Paradise Cove



22 hikers traveled to Malibu and Westward Beach Road where we took advantage of free parking along the road and then hiked to the parking lot trailhead, spotting a solitary seal off-

shore along the way. The temperature was pleasant since there was an early morning marine layer as we began hiking up onto Point Dume.

After an easy climb, we hiked through a maze of trails surrounded by a “forest” of dormant coreopsis plants to the east side of the peninsula with a breathtaking view of Dume Cove and the Pacific Ocean. We then descended a rusty stairway that led down to Dume Beach. Despite being fairly close to low tide (11:00), our beach walk to Paradise Cove consisted of rocky stretches interspersed with long sandy expanses; at several points we timed our passage to the outflow of waves as we scampered carefully across the exposed bottom before our shoes were inundated by the next wave (all of which made for an interesting passage). We pretty much had the beach to ourselves as we enjoyed the ocean sounds and sights until we eventually arrived at the Paradise Cove Beach Café

(<http://www.paradisecovemalibu.com>), a landmark for decades. We rested for a while in the free-of-charge Adirondack chairs facing the ocean outside the restaurant and watched as our resident merman made another appearance to the amusement of several of the other beachgoers. The marine layer had lifted and the beach had become busier when we decided to walk out on the nearby pier where several people were fishing (until recently the pier had been closed for several years). After a while we resumed our hike and headed back along the beach the way we had come; the tide was now “coming in” but it was still possible to minimize getting our boots wet. After climbing back onto Point Dume, we hiked along a partially sand-covered wooden walkway to an observation platform which afforded views of the ocean and then climbed on up to the flat top of Point Dume with 360-degree views of the surrounding area. We then returned to the main trail and descended to the parking lot and hiked back to our vehicles, returning home having completed a very pleasant 7-mile hike with about 400’ of elevation gain/loss.

November 18th – Work Party – The Hummingbird Trail

Great work party with a combination of Trailblazers and local Geocachers. Fourteen people showed up ready to work; basic tools and instructions were given out and off we went. Work was done on the first half a mile of trail, from the trailhead to the creek crossing. Our historian for the day, Cheri captured the pictures for us.

We removed some rocks, trimmed trees, cleared the trail of brush, widened out some of the trail and

even built a bridge going over a drainage pipe on one of the little side creek crossings.

Much discussion about a variety things including, of course, solving the world’s problems, while work continued. At the end, we got to rest under some oaks and talk about the next project.

The Geocachers in the group made plans on continuing up the trail to find some of the Geocaches on Hummingbird trail. A big thanks to all of those who pitched in today, including a foreign exchange student from Spain who chipped in and gave up their Saturday morning to help out the community and give back a comfortable trail to explore.

November 25th – Las Lajas Trail to the Shovel

22 hikers met at the Las Lajas Canyon trailhead on Evening Sky Drive in Simi Valley on a temporarily cool autumn morning. We began our hike under a clear blue sky by descending a short paved section of road into the canyon bottom; from there we followed the wide well-graded dirt road upstream to the north 1.8 miles, crossing the dry stream bed three times.

We then followed a slightly overgrown “use” trail (the remnants of an old mining road) as we climbed up the eastern slope of the mountain, atop which we enjoyed panoramic views of the surrounding area including parts of Chivo Canyon, Las Lajas Canyon, the Santa Susana Mountains, Simi Valley, and the San Fernando Valley; also today we could see part of Anacapa Island. We took a break when we reached our goal, the site of a coquina (a soft whitish limestone formed of broken shells and corals cemented together and used for road building) mining operation. Various mining equipment artifacts are strewn about near the mining site, most notably a P&H Model 206 “steam” shovel. The day had warmed up noticeably but we enjoyed a mild breeze as we retraced our route and returned to our vehicles having completed a pleasant 6.3-mile hike with 1,100’ of elevation gain/loss.

EQUESTRIANS IN ROCK ART

An unusual Chumash pictograph site in the Santa Monica Mountains is focused on four riders on horses and/or mules. During 2000 I photographed the site. It is known as LAn-717. An academic analysis of the site by Gregory A. Reinhardt, entitled "Pictographs with a Historic Component: LAn-717, A Los Angeles County Rock Art Site," appears in *Messages from the Past: Studies in California Rock Art*, Monograph XX, Institute of Archaeology, University of California, Los Angeles, n.d.

The panel is done nearly entirely in red pigment. The riders are arranged in a line - one after the other - as though they represent a particular group of equestrians and a particular event. Because of the consistency of style that is shared by each image, it would seem that all four figures were painted by the same individual. The horses are accurately depicted, as are the riders in relationship to the horses. The artist, then, would appear to be an eye witness - not someone simply depicting an event passed by word of mouth from one person to another. At least three groups of ritualistic figures seem to face the equestrians from below - in awe of what they see. The panel is focused on the riders as though their passage represents a major event in the life of the Chumash observers. The panel, at least most of it, was certainly composed during the historic period. The composition may celebrate the first encounter with people of western European culture and the horse or mule. So, who do the equestrians represent?

Most likely the rock art panel depicts members of the 1769 Portola expeditions. Portola's first expedition left San Diego in early summer of 1769 to meet with the packet boat, San Antonio, at Monterey Bay. The land force, which included Fray Junipera Serra, passed down the Santa Clara River valley well north of the rock art site on August 10, 1769, and sent scouts south to explore for a possible coastal route to Monterey.

Portola missed the San Antonio, which did land at Point Conception about 125 miles west of the Malibu on its return voyage. They inquired of the Chumash Indians that they met about the Portola expedition and were informed through gestures about how the expedition had passed through the area on horseback going north and then about their return. The Indians acted out the scene by sitting astride water casks, which had been brought ashore, and made appropriate gestures to indicate horsemen.

Juan Rodrigues Cabrillo had travelled up and down the coast by ship in 1542-43 as well as Viscaino in 1602. Captain Francis Drake sailed along the California coast in 1579. Vessels of the Manila trade also passed along the coast every other year or so throughout the 16th, 17th and 18th centuries. There is no record to indicate that any of those vessels carried any horses or mules. Therefore, the Portola expedition of 1769 resulted in the first exposure that Native Americans in the area could have had any exposure to horses or any equine species.

The Anza expedition came through southern California in 1774. However, Anza travelled well north of the Santa Monica Mountains.

Another explanation is that the pictograph panel was painted during the mission period as magic against the Spanish intruders. If this were the case, one might expect more than just four riders and many other motifs of Spanish life. The four riders, as previously stated, seem to depict an event. However, it is still possible that a group of formerly friendly Chumash Indians returned to this old place of "power" to call upon adverse power to rid the land of the now unwanted invaders by controlling their spirits.

Finally, one is tempted to refer to the equestrians as the "four horsemen of the Apocalypse," a story that could have been relayed by priests in the missions. This seems unlikely since the biblical horsemen carried a bow, a pair of balance scales, and a sword. Only one equestrian at LAn-

717 seems to be carrying anything and that seems to be a lantern.

So, my money is on the depiction of members of the scouting party of the 1969 Portola expedition. How could the Indians know that the event would lead to the utter destruction of their culture and the death of 80-85% of their population within three to four decades. A universe collapsed and another took its place. How sad for us all.

REGULARLY SCHEDULED HIKE (Rain cancels – No hikes on holidays)

Sunday Evening - Rocky Peak Fire Road

Meet at **4PM** at the Rocky Peak Fire Road trailhead on the northern side of the Rocky Peak exit from State Route 118. Take the Rocky Peak exit on the 118 Freeway and head north over the freeway. Park at the trailhead or across the bridge on the Santa Susana Pass Road. (Strenuous - 4.8 MRT - 1,200' elevation gain) **(We Meet at 5PM during daylight saving time.)**

Tuesday Evening - Mt. McCoy Trail

Meet at **6PM** in the parking lot, located to the south of Donut Delite, near the NE corner of Madera and Royal. (Moderate - 3.07 MRT - 600' elevation gain)
